Desert Recreation District and Other Agencies join forces to bring relief to North Shore residents during power outage

North Shore, CA (September 1, 2021) – In response to a power outage that began on Tuesday, August 31 and is anticipated to last several days according to Imperial Irrigation District (IID), Desert Recreation District (DRD) opened its doors to those community members impacted by the outage. The blackout was caused by high winds, and left area residents not only in the dark, but without a way to keep cool during some of the hottest weeks of the year in the Valley.



DRD operates the North Shore Beach & Yacht Club, located at 99-155 Sea View Drive in North Shore as a community center where health & fitness programming, along with youth activities and classes take place. During the summers, this location is one of several that DRD uses as a Cooling Center where residents can sit inside the air-conditioned building and have some cold water and snacks, thanks in part to a partnership with the County of Riverside's Community Action Partnership (CAP).

As the power outage knocked the DRD facility offline too, IID has contributed generators that are powering the North Shore Beach & Yacht Club so that Desert Recreation District can continue to offer it as a Cooling Center. Since this power outage is expected to last

several days, DRD has expanded the hours at the center, which will now be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. until power is restored. In addition, DRD's Mecca Community Center at 65-250 Coahuilla Street in Mecca, will also be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Other agencies contributing to the efforts to ease the pain of not having electricity right now are Supervisor V. Manuel Perez's office, which provided additional supplies including bringing in food on Tuesday evening to help feed residents and is working with the county and Fantasy Springs to offer emergency sheltering, and IID is offering a limited number of hotel vouchers for those most vulnerable (seniors, those with underlying health issues, etc.).

The Salvation Army is also contributing food for the families in the area; according to a post on social media earlier today, they are providing lunch and dinner through Saturday, September 4 as needed, at 12 p.m. and 6 p.m., as well as giving out breakfast items.
