



A NEW PLACE TO PLAY IN 2018

THE STORY OF NORTH SHORE COMMUNITY PARK

The North Shore Community Park, the first community park in this area, began several years ago as the need for a safe and productive public space in the eastern Coachella Valley became more apparent. In the past five years, we began actively developing this project and we are thrilled that the Grand Opening will be happening October 12, 2018. Included in the park are basketball and soccer areas, a playground, skate park, and more.



BACKGROUND:

Beginning in 2013, in partnership with Kounkuey Design Initiative (KDI), the community engagement process was initiated with the residents of North Shore for the design, construction, and programming of a productive public space.



The 5-acre parcel where the park has been built was determined to be the ideal site location, and through the partnerships with KDI, Desert Recreation District (DRD) and the now-disbanded Desert Alliance for Community Empowerment, acquisition of land permissions for the site, the design and development moved forward with a series of community workshops that helped residents prioritize the desired components of the public space. Residents were able to determine which components would be part of the site plan, and they helped create and agree upon on a site plan that conveyed their preferred adjacencies of components, such as playground near exercise equipment, or bathroom in middle of site, and ensuring there would be at least one component for each age group.

Based on the community site plan, a schematic site plan was developed by KDI's design team. The North Shore Productive Public Space schematic site plan was designed to house the following physical and programmatic components: physical-full-size soccer field, sport court, skate plaza, kids recreation area, adult



exercise circuit, shade pavilion, restrooms, bike repair station; programmatic-bike share program, small business training program and farmers market, and arts/culture programming (to activate and connect residents to the new public space). The plan was subsequently developed into construction drawings with continuous community input and participation.

While KDI's team was hard at work, DRD approached the development and construction of the project using capital reserves while applying for, and obtaining, grant funding to not only build the North Shore Community Park, but to also begin the development for the first community parks in the communities of Oasis and Thermal.

FUNDING: The largest of the grants received was from the California Natural Resources Agency, by way of the state's Urban Greening Program that is funded by Cap-and-Trade revenues, which awards grants to support projects that aim to reduce greenhouse gases by sequestering carbon, decreasing energy consumption, and reducing vehicle miles traveled.





The projects supported also convert built environments into green spaces that improve air and water quality, and provide opportunities for walking, biking, and recreation.

Desert Recreation District was awarded \$3,086,000 for the North Shore Community Park project thanks to the Urban Greening Program; these funds meant additional elements of the park, that had been previously scaled back for budgetary reasons, were able to be included further enhancing the health and environmental benefits of the project.











On December 8, 2017, California Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon joined Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia, Riverside County Supervisor V. Manuel Perez, Desert Recreation District General Manager Kevin Kalman and **Desert Recreation District** Board President Silvia Paz. as well as other local stakeholders for a Roundtable Discussion to address critical park infrastructure needs and the Salton Sea. The visit commenced with a check presentation for the \$3,086,000 California Natural Resources Agency's **Urban Greening Program** Grant award to Desert Recreation District. The event was held at DRD's Palm Desert Community Center in Palm Desert, CA.

A NEW PLACE TO PLAY IN 2019/2020

OASIS COMMUNITY PARK

In September of 2016 we opened the Oasis Soccer Field on a former elementary school site, which DRD purchased from the Coachella Valley Unified School District (CVUSD) to build a 15-acre community park. The Oasis Community Park is the second of three community parks that we are developing in the eastern Coachella Valley, and is currently 90% through the design development phase. We are hoping to go to bid for construction in 2019.



BACKGROUND:

Once DRD purchased the land, we began to clear the rest of the dilapidated and unsafe school infrastructure, so we could develop and open the temporary soccer field. Our next steps were to design the park amenities with the community.

Partnering again with Kounkuey Design Initiative (KDI) as we had for the North Shore Community Park, there were several workshops held to solicit input from residents of Oasis to ask what they would like to see in the new park site. We then put all the amenities and programs identified during interviews with residents and during the workshops in a survey and asked over 100 people what their top 10 and top 3 amenities and programs they would like included in the new park. Additional gatherings were held so residents could be walked through the park budget and how much funds are available for specific park amenities.

Taking all of this into consideration, residents were then tasked with the job of selecting which amenities should be a part of the new park site.

FUNDING:

Applications for grants have been submitted to several organizations including the Coachella Valley Mountain Conservancy, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), and the Land Water
Conservancy Fund. At the time
of publication of this Report, we
have been awarded \$500,000
from the Coachella Valley
Mountain Conservancy Fund and
\$150,000 from CDBG, and another
\$1,700,000 in funding
recommended for the Land Water
Conservancy Fund. We are still
raising money to build the park as
it is estimated to cost \$6-6.5 million
based on the park design and
amenities that will be included.

In addition to tournament play, there are also opportunities like attending The First Tee Life Skills and Leadership Academy. Dana Condon and Caroline Wales from TFTCV were both selected to attend the Academy in July 2017.



SUMMER CAMP KIDS HONOR VETERANS



Desert Recreation District partnered with the non-profit Old Town Artisan Studios in La Quinta to answer the call of duty by joining forces on a project benefitting U.S. Veterans. Children in our summer camp programs painted more than 200 tiles with designs such as American flags, peace symbols, messages of gratitude,

and even special forces logos. The project was fun and educational as children learned about honor, sacrifice, and patriotism while saying thank you to Veterans. The tiles were then placed on the public water fountain followed by a dedication ceremony and celebration on Veteran's Day, November 11, 2017.

ENGAGING HEROES WITH HORSES



In partnership with the
Coachella Valley Horse Rescue
(CVHR), Desert Recreation District
is able to help veterans returning
from active duty through the
therapeutic equine program
called Engaging Heroes with
Horses for Veterans pilot
program. The unique unmounted
training program provides
therapy to veterans suffering

from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), anxiety, and depression through the care-taking of horses.

PATRIOT RIDE FOR OUR HEROES

We ponsored the Patriot Ride for Our Heroes, this event benefits local charities associated with Active Military, Veterans, Fire, & Police – hence the Patriot Ride!

This year we implemented a Buy One, Give One (BOGO) offer.

When participants registered (bought) to walk or bike ride in the event, DRD sponsored (gave) a child to take part in the Trips for Kids Coachella Valley program. Trips for Kids Coachella Valley is a mountain biking program for youth 10 to 17 years of age that focuses on lessons in personal responsibility, achievement and environmental awareness through the simple act of having fun.

VETERAN GUITAR PROGRAM BEGINS

In 2017 DRD partnered with the Mission Veterans initiating the Coachella Valley Veteran Guitar Program, a way for veterans to gather and learn to play guitar in a therapeutic learning environment. Desert Recreation District purchased and provided guitars, tuners, and guitar pics for veterans enrolled in the program. The 12-week program is designed to offer fun, easy lessons in a veteran friendly environment.








Adaptive/Therapeutic Sports & Recreation

Our programming for those with special needs has continued to expand and in addition to sports such as adaptive archery, pickleball, basketball and fitness, we have added recreational programming including adaptive ballroom dance and ukulele & voice for those who would like to let their artistic sides shine.

Thanks to these and other adaptive programs, we have seen an increase in participation from approximately 50 individuals with disabilities served per year to almost 400 disabled participants having taken part in these classes and events!






Revenue and Resources

Reducing Green House Gases

Through planting 293 drought tolerant trees and 3,918 shrubs as we built the North Shore Community Park, the green house gas and energy benefits were qualified through the ARB quantification methodology (this is a method used to measure green house gas emissions and anticipated outcomes) as follow:

- Carbon sequestration estimated at 444.817lbs CO2e
- Energy savings estimated at 39.6 MWh
- Natural gas savings estimated at 285.2 Therms



In plain language,
this means better air quality
for those not only using the
park, but for everyone in the
Coachella Valley. Another
benefit to having trees planted
in and around the park is
the formation of a tree
canopy that will act as
a barrier and help combat
the drift of pesticides that
are often used in agriculture,
as well as green house gases
from highways.



Energy Conservation – Lighting

As our more than 30 facilities, which include a golf course and driving range, swimming pools, community and fitness centers, sports fields, and various parks and open spaces need to have lightbulbs replaced, we are switching from fluorescent or incandescent lighting to LED lighting for energy and cost savings. We have begun with our Indio Community Center, and by the time we have upgraded all of our locations to LED lighting, we will have replaced thousands of bulbs, and each bulb changed to a LED can mean as much as \$170

in saved energy costs. Other benefits of LED lighting can include:

- They do not contain mercury like Compact Fluorescent lights
- They do not produce heat
- A 60-watt incandescent bulb's average life span is 1,200 hours while a comparable LED bulb is 10 watts and has an average life span of 25,000 hours

These changes not only translates into cost savings but also demonstrates we practice what we encourage everyone to do, which is to reduce our impact on the environment and help preserve parks and green spaces for future generations.
