General Manager's Message



While FY2020 started off strong with our expanded programming in areas such as Adaptive/Therapeutic Sports & Recreation and the completion of the renovation of The Golf Center at Palm Desert in November 2019, things changed rapidly in the early months of 2020.

We began the fiscal year by continuing with our Master Planning, assessing current and future conditions so we could adjust our plans as may be needed to make sure we capture the rapidly evolving community needs. This is vital in building or renovating facilities, developing new parks and playgrounds, and in providing programming and services.

During the Spring of 2020, we launched our completely redesigned website to make accessing all of our resources – from classes, events and activities to finding a nearby park or pool – streamlined and meaningful whether on a desktop computer or smart phone or tablet.

As the COVID-19 pandemic changed everyone's daily routine, we identified where we could quickly pivot and provide critical community support, which included ramping up the frequency and number of locations for Food Distributions, partnering with healthcare providers to offer testing, as well as continuing to offer flu shots and other important community services. This also meant rather than offering afterschool programs, we began planning

for distance learning in the late summer as it became apparent schools would not be able to open for in-person learning for the 2020-2021 school year.

We also created our Online Recreation and Resource Center that featured more than 75 online resources for children and adults, and included educational, recreational, health and fitness and arts and crafts activities.

Unfortunately, the pandemic has impacted the District on multiple fronts. First and foremost, our exceptional team of recreation professionals dropped from 320 in February to 9 team members in March, due to the Governor's stay at home order. Over the course of the 4th quarter we were able to add back approximately 40 team members to care for our critical infrastructure and sustain business operations. The sudden halt to our programming left us short on revenue offset only by the reduction in our workforce.

Leading into Fiscal Year 2021, we are planning for the end of the pandemic and resuming all previously offered services. We are hopeful of bringing every one of our valued team members back to work and providing the essential services our community has come to expect of us. Until we can see each other face to face, please be safe, wear your mask, and social distance.

Renovation of the Golf Center at Palm Desert

In November 2019, the District held a Grand Reopening of our Golf Center at Palm Desert, which is the home of the First Tee – Coachella Valley. Improvements made as part of the renovation included:

The addition of 20 more driving range decks
Installation of a new irrigation system
New tees and greens
New nets on driving range

The new irrigation system sup**p**orts our goal of environmental stewardship, as this new system features isolated sprinkler heads where control of each head is independent of the others. This individual control allows for elimination of dry spots where there is not enough water without over-watering sections that do not need it – which leads to more efficient water usage and conservation.



Cal-Fresh Park Activation


Desert Recreation District has partnered with CalFresh to activate programs in five of our parks in the Coachella Valley area, which are: Indio, Thousand Palms, Mecca, North Shore and Thermal. Due to grant funding from CalFresh, we are able to offer outdoor fitness programs in our community parks at no charge to community members. The goal of the program is to engage youth in regular exercise and educate them about the benefits of regular fitness, and putting healthy food and drinks in their bodies.

CalFresh Healthy Living (SNAP-Ed) supports healthy, active and nourished lifestyles by teaching Californians about good nutrition and how to stretch their food dollars, while also building partnerships in communities to make the healthy choice, the easy choice. In addition to teaching the community about healthy eating and drinking, this program inspires youth in our communities to make fitness a regular part of their lives. The mission of this program is to inspire and empower underserved Californians to improve their health by promoting awareness, education, and community change through diverse partnerships, resulting in healthy eating and active living.



Pivoting To Provide Essential Public Services

As the District moved into 2020, the focus was on enhancing and expanding services, and making those services easy to find on our redesigned website. Mid-March brought a startling change to our plans, with the COVID-19 pandemic causing our programs to come to an abrupt halt as we suspended them due to various state and local regulations and recommendations, including but not limited to Governor Newsom's Stay-at-Home order and recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

However, as many of us have heard over the years, the tough times are when we look for new and innovative ways to help others. For the District, this meant that while we have always offered a variety of activities that are very important to the health and wellbeing of our residents, we now took a step back to see what essential services we could offer in a world that was familiar to some but not to others – providing many services virtually.

We began by offering access to more than 75 online resources for children and adults, ranging from education and arts & crafts to health & fitness activities, exercises to keep one's mind sharp, virtual museum tours and more. We also implemented enhanced cleaning and disinfecting protocols (following CDC and/or Riverside County Public Health guidelines), added signage about staying home if a person is exhibiting symptoms or has been exposed











to anyone with COVID-19, as well as reminders for frequent hand washing, social distancing, and to wear a face covering or mask. The health and safety of our staff and guests is our top priority. Our Golf Center at Palm Desert, home of First Tee – Coachella Valley, instituted the "Park and Play" guidance which included recommendations for handling golf balls, golf cart occupancy and more.

Then as Spring turned to Summer and the reality that inperson schooling was not likely to happen for the 2020-2021 school year, we began the steps to become an essential distance-learning provider to allow critical service workers to still go to work while having a safe place for their child to do their remote-access schoolwork and after-school care. We were able to have more distance between children and other safety measures that schools could not offer, and therefore have a limited number of children in our multiple locations of the ED REC CONNECT program.

In addition to ED REC CONNECT, which served nearly 100 children, working with various community partners we also increased the number of locations and frequency of the FIND Food Distributions, offered free flu vaccines and COVID-19 testing, as well as hosting PPE giveaways that served several of the most vulnerable populations in our Valley.
